JEFFERSON JUMPSTART

We all know the importance of having some "rainy day" money set aside for those unexpected, big expenses. Whether it's in a savings account, an IRA, or even a few Krugerrands buried in a Mason jar in the backyard, we save for those moments when something essential, like the hot water heater or the roof, needs urgent repair. Our church has a similar fund, but last month, we had to tap into it for about \$1,000 to cover regular expenses. If we keep withdrawing at this rate, our savings will be reduced by about 30% by the end of the year, leaving us much less prepared for any major issues that might arise.

In the Gospel lesson, Jesus spoke about how a tiny mustard seed can grow into a large, flourishing plant. This reminds us that small actions, when done consistently, can lead to significant results. Last Thursday evening, as our Church Council mulled over this problem, they realized that **if each of us increases our weekly offering by just \$10, we can replace the money we had to withdraw this month AND cover our monthly bills going forward** without further depleting our savings.

Though \$10 might seem like a small amount—less than a Starbucks run or a trip through the McDonald's drive through, **that little bump in your weekly offering will add up over time to have a big impact**, helping to ensure that our congregation is financially stable and well prepared for the future. It's much easier to get ahead of this now, rather than to try to make up for a much larger problem by the end of the year.

Which brings us to the second issue...during the Summer months, we typically see a significant drop in worship attendance as folks enjoy the opportunity to travel out of town. When we are away from church on a Sunday morning, very few of us make it a point to send in our weekly offering before leaving or doubling up on the week when we return. An easy way to avoid this embarrassing oversight is by using the electronic giving option that we have through Tithely. There's a QR code in the bulletin which you can scan with your smartphone, or you can visit the link on our church website, or you can call the church office to get set up. It's really that easy!

Talking about money is a touchy subject. We're a church, after all, we're not in the money business, we're in the ministry business. Of course, we also know that it takes money to do the ministry of the church. We need both! Let's sow seeds of faith and generosity together and watch our church grow strong and resilient!

The meeting was called to order by President, Ian Gillespie at 6:30 PM. Pastor Steve Stutz led the group in the opening prayer and devotion.

MAY COUNCIL MINUTES

Donna Reavis reported that Jennifer Crizer had been omitted from the Youth & amp; Family report as a recent graduate, and also omitted from the May Minutes.

Kim Holle MOVED, Donna Reavis seconded, to approve the May 9 Council Minutes with the correction to include Jennifer Crizer as a recent graduate. Motion carried.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Pastor Steve reported that he had sent his report to Council prior to the meeting and asked if there were any questions about it. (Report filed in Minutes.) In his report he noted that he has been meeting with Council members to get their ideas about St. Paul's and will welcome meeting with other church members as well. He and Jada meet weekly to review the calendar, (including the social media calendar), worship services, education, meetings and activities, pastoral care, and future activities.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Kim Holle distributed the Treasurer's Report for May, 2024, noting that expenses exceeded income in the amount of \$2,396.14.

Discussion was held regarding the deficit of \$981.54 and how it should be addressed. It was recommended that members would be asked to increase their giving by \$10 weekly. John Schlobohm MOVED, Cat Mahan seconded, to approve the financials as presented and the \$10 per week giving recommendation. Motion carried.

OLD BUSINESS Security System

ProCam has replaced the security equipment at the church. Cameras not focusing correctly were scheduled to be repaired the week following council.

Stewardship Committee

We will proceed with the \$10 per week giving campaign at the present time.

<u>NEW BUSINESS</u> <u>Committee Reports</u>

Property

- Completed fire extinguisher recertification and installation of 15 extinguishers. Total cost was \$930. Kim Holle MOVED, John Schlobohm seconded, and the motion carried, to approve the \$930 cost.
- Completed installation of new camera security system. The cost of 5 new cameras with a recording unit was \$2,470, which was previously approved. However there was an additional charge of \$110 to upgrade the monitor mounting brackets. Kim Holle MOVED, Susan Clanton seconded, to approve the \$110. Motion carried.
- There was a pipe leak in the kitchen, resulting in water on the kitchen and parlor floors. Kurt repaired the leak, and Benny, from the janitorial service, vacuumed the water.

House Blessing "Pastor, there's something strange happening to my house. Could you come over?"

What are some signs that you might have something diabolic nesting in your home? Here is a short, non-exhaustive list:

- Sounds or blows to the house
- Sounds of footsteps or movement
- Loud noises
- The disappearance of objects

- Pets becoming terrified
- Object levitating or being thrown
- Unusual scents and odors
- Electrical interference

• Sudden gusts of wind

None of these signs are definitive proof of a diabolic infestation. Therefore, a thorough investigation should be conducted to rule out natural causes. For example, banging in the attic might simply be a raccoon that entered through a torn screen.

Possible origins of diabolic infestation can include curses on the location, seances held in the dwelling, rituals performed by practitioners of magic, heinous crimes, suicides, abortions on the premises, rites of evocation or devotion to the devil, or the profaning of holy objects.

The first step is to rule out natural causes and research any potential activities that could have allowed entry. If you need help with this step, we have resources to guide you.

Once this is done, contact the Pastor. There is a ritual for the Blessing of a Home (ELW Pastoral Care, p. 337) that often provides relief, especially when combined with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. Call the church office for more information.
